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Introduction

Exploring Africa is a comprehensive curriculum designed to educate about Africa in a true, objective way. Each unit is designed with a theme in mind: Why Study Africa?, Studying Africa through the Social Studies, Studying Africa through the Humanities, Regional Perspectives, and Country Case Studies. Using these themes allows Exploring Africa to provide a well-rounded, interdisciplinary, and holistic approach to learning about Africa. Within each unit, there are modules constructed in a more specific thematic organization, which creates an even more accessible format for learning in a systematic way. Finally, within each module there are activities designed to help students comprehend the lessons they just learned. Each of these activities is aligned to the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). It is here in this Exploring Africa Lesson Plan Digital Booklet that we offer lesson plans designed for the physical classroom space, to be used and implemented in your own classroom, and adjusted in any way you see fit to meet your individual classroom's needs. It is highly recommended that these lesson plans for activities are supplemental to the lessons in the modules in Exploring Africa. These lesson plans are for the activities only, and not the lessons for which they are designed.

Unit Four

Regional Perspectives

Module Seventeen: West Africa

The purpose of Module Seventeen is to introduce students to the region of West Africa. As explained in the Introduction to Module Twenty: Southern Africa, regional groupings and divisions are constructed categories to help geographers and other scholars categorize the world. The boundaries that divide these regions are not firm and fixed. In fact, they often blur together, shift according to one's point of view, and change over time. The region of West Africa will be discussed here as a grouping of countries made by geographers based on some common geographical, cultural, economic, and political features. Yet it is a region that also contains much diversity within its boundaries and many connections to regions outside of West Africa. This module will begin by discussing these issues in general in Activity One: What is West Africa?

Next the module will continue by examining in more depth the diversity of geography, culture, society, politics, and economics in West Africa in Activity Two: Geography of West Africa and Activity Three: Culture, Society, and Production in West Africa. These activities will give students a sense of the lives and histories experienced by people of West Africa. It will end by tying what they have learned to current events in West Africa today in Activity Four: Current Events in West Africa, many of which they can read about in newspapers and on-line.

What is West Africa?

Time Needed	Approximately 30 minutes
Prior Knowledge	None needed

Objectives

- Have a clear understanding of the concept of region, and how this concept is articulated in West Africa
- Critically think about the limitations of the human tendency to divide the world into regions

Time	Learning Task	Methods or Procedures
5 min	Students receive reading guide, listen to instructions, and get on Exploring Africa	Teacher hands out reading guide and instructs students to get on Module Seventeen, Activity One of Exploring Africa.
15 min	Students read through the text of activity one, answering the questions on their reading guide as they go.	Individual student work; teacher monitors and assists as needed.
5 min	Quick check: students have five minutes to write down the names of as many West African countries as they remember, without looking up the answer.	Individual student work; teacher assigns the check and encourages students to remember as many countries as possible.
5 min	Quick Check Part 2: students now have another five minutes to go through their list of West African countries, and for each one try and write down something they know about that country.	Individual student work; teacher assigns the second part of the check, and encourages students to write something substantial about each country (i.e. don't write 'this country is a part of West Africa' as their fact)

5 min	Students receive reading guide, listen to instructions, and get on Exploring Africa.	Teacher hands out reading guide and instructs students to get on Module Seventeen, Activity Two of Exploring Africa.
10 min	Students read through the text in Activity Two	Individual student work; teacher monitors and assists as needed.
10 min	Students use the maps from Activity Two to complete their reading guide.	Individual student work; teacher monitors and assists as needed.

Early 1800's: Liberia was originally created as a country by freed Black slaves sent there from America.

1980: Coup d'etat led by Samuel Doe

1988: US cut off aid to Liberia

1989: National Patriotic Front of Liberia (NPFL) crossed over the Liberian border from Côte d'Ivoire to overthrow Samuel Doe's government. The 7-year civil war begins.

1992: Charles Taylor and the NPFL controlled most of Liberia.

1996: Civil war ends
